### 2022 WOMEN'S FINAL FOUR GAME DATES/TIMES (LOCAL CT):

- **Friday, April 1**, National Semifinals  
6 and 8:30 p.m. CT on ESPN.
- **Sunday, April 3**, National Championship  
7 p.m. CT on ESPN.

**SITE:** Target Center, Minneapolis, Minnesota.

**WOMEN'S FINAL FOUR SEATING CAPACITY:** 18,067.

**HOSTS:** The University of Minnesota, Twin Cities and Minnesota Sports and Events.

**TELEVISION BROADCAST:** For the 19th consecutive year, an ESPN channel will broadcast all 67 games of the 2022 NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Championship. This marks the 27th straight year (since 1996) ESPN is the championship's exclusive television home. All games will be available online via the ESPN App. The 2022 NCAA Women's Final Four is expected to be distributed to over 200 countries around the world.

**RADIO BROADCAST:** NCAA Radio Network coverage of the championship has included as many as 234 affiliate stations in the top markets nationwide, including a simulcast on SiriusXM Satellite Radio.

#### Celebrating History

2022 will mark the 40th anniversary year of NCAA women's championships as the NCAA celebrates its 116th year as an Association.

#### By the Numbers

**1** – Number of appearances by schools from the State of Minnesota in the Women's Final Four. The University of Minnesota, coached by Pam Borton, participated in the 2004 Women's Final Four in New Orleans, falling to UConn in the national semifinals.

**2** – The 2022 Women's Final Four in Minneapolis will mark the second time that the city has played host to America's marquee women's sporting event, hosting previously in 1995.

**1<sup>st</sup> of 11** – The 1995 Women's Final Four in Minneapolis was a sign of things to come in women's basketball, as the UConn Huskies scored the first of their record 11 team national championships. The championship in 1995 capped a perfect 35-0 season for the Huskies.

**15** – In the 39 previous Women's Final Four's going into 2022, 15 different schools have captured the national championship, led by UConn with 11 titles. Stanford enters the season as the defending national champion, winning the 2021 title in San Antonio.

**4,077,000** – The 2021 NCAA Division I Women's College Basketball Championship game – a thrilling 54-53 victory for top-seed Stanford over Arizona – averaged 4,077,000 viewers and is the most-viewed women's championship game since 2014.

**8,323,217** – Number of fans that have attended NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Championship games over the past 39 years.
